FIFTH AIR FORCE, SOUTH-WEST PACIFIC—Capt. Morgan F. Terry, Jr., of Alpine, Texas. is en route home after completing 420 hours of aerial action in the Southwest Pacific. He is the husband of Mrs. Elinor Ray Terry of Alpine and the son of Morgan F. Terry, Sr., of

Alice, Texas. Capt. Terry is a pilot in the crew Mrs. Floyd C. Price, Jr. of a Liberator bomber of the famous Jolly Roger heavy bomber outfit which is a part of the bomber command of the Fifth Air Force. He has flown on 65 combat missions and has been awarded the Air Medal and three Oak Leaf Clusters. He has also qualified as a pilot of a P-38 fighter plane.

> Jolly Roger heavy bombers have shot down nearly 400 Jap planes, destroyed hundreds more on the ground, sunk half a million tons of enemy shipping and struck the opening blow of the Philippine and other major campaigns to become the Allies' acrial spearhead in the Southwest Pacific.

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


