Miss Elizabeth Whitaker had charge of the program and made a most interesting talk on "Woman's Privileges".

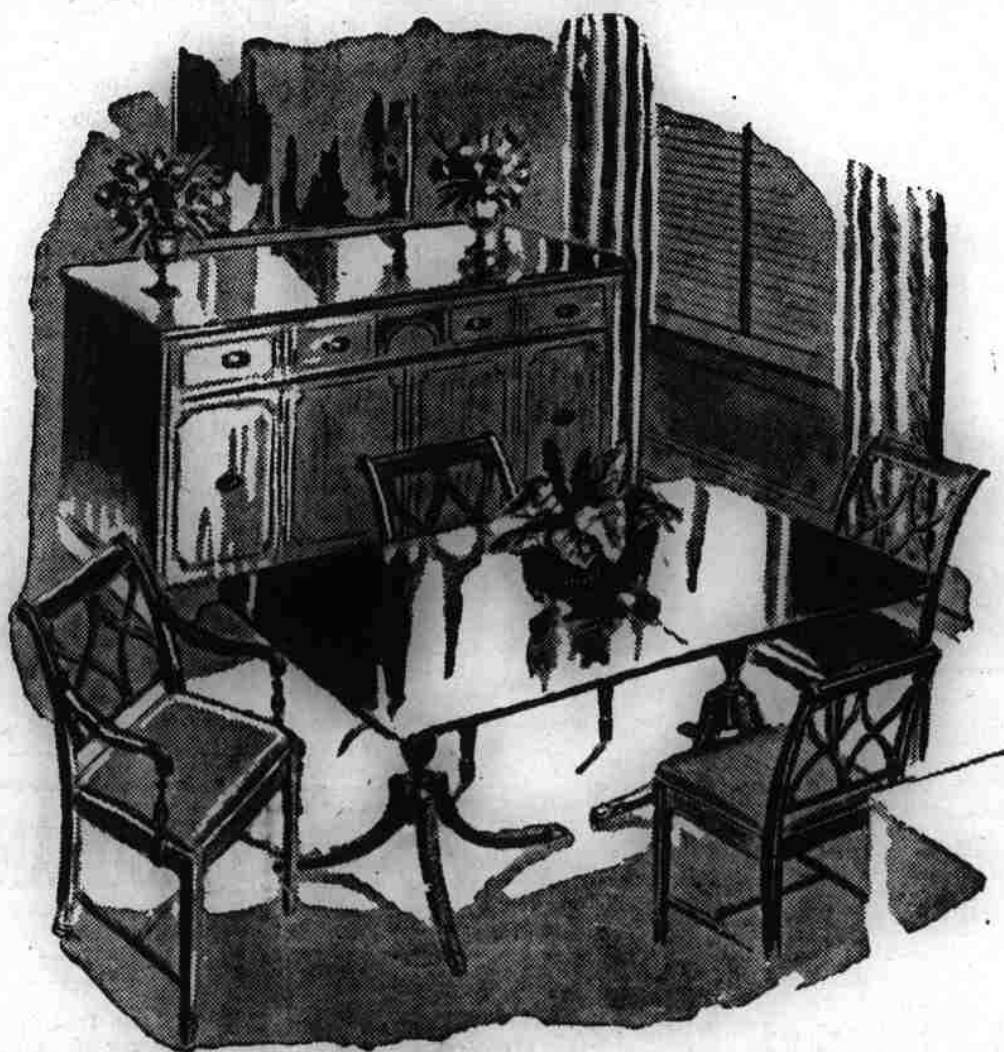
