MOUNT OLIVE - The Board of Directors has voted to make no increase in tuition, room, board, and general fee at Mount Olive College for next year. An increase from \$10 to \$20 per semester will be made in the student activity fee, however, in order for the College to provide an enriched program of social, cultural, and recreational activities.

Total expenses for resident students next year will be \$225, one of the lowest rates charged by any accredited church-related college in North Carolina.
