He discussed the basic principles of chemical and weed control, how to get the most out of each herbicide dollar, how long chemicals are effective in the soil, how to apply weed tillers for best results and many other subjects.

Eberwine through posters and film presented, a thorough program on weed and insect control and talked of various methods of application of the chemical, Of much interest to the group was the use of chemicals in the control of resistant wireworms in tobacco which is a problem in this particular area.
