## Judith Thomas Betty Crocker Winner From BHS

Judith A. Thomas is winner from Beulaville high school of Beulaville, N. C. in the 1963 Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She has become eligible for a total of 102 scholarships with a total value of \$110,000.

Having scored first in her school in the knowledge and attitude test on homemaking given senior night Dec. 4, the winner's paper has been entered in competition with those of other state high school winners for state-wide honors.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named in the spring. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, sponsor of the program. A \$500 award will be made to the second highest ranking Homemaker of Tomorrow in the state. The second highest ranking winner will receive a \$250 award from the Encyclopedia Britannica.

Later, State Homemakers of Tomorrow with their advisors will arrange an expense-paid educational tour of New York City, Washington, D. C. and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. which will culminate with the naming of the 1963 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The national winner's scholarship will be raised to \$5,000, with second, third and fourth place winners being granted \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

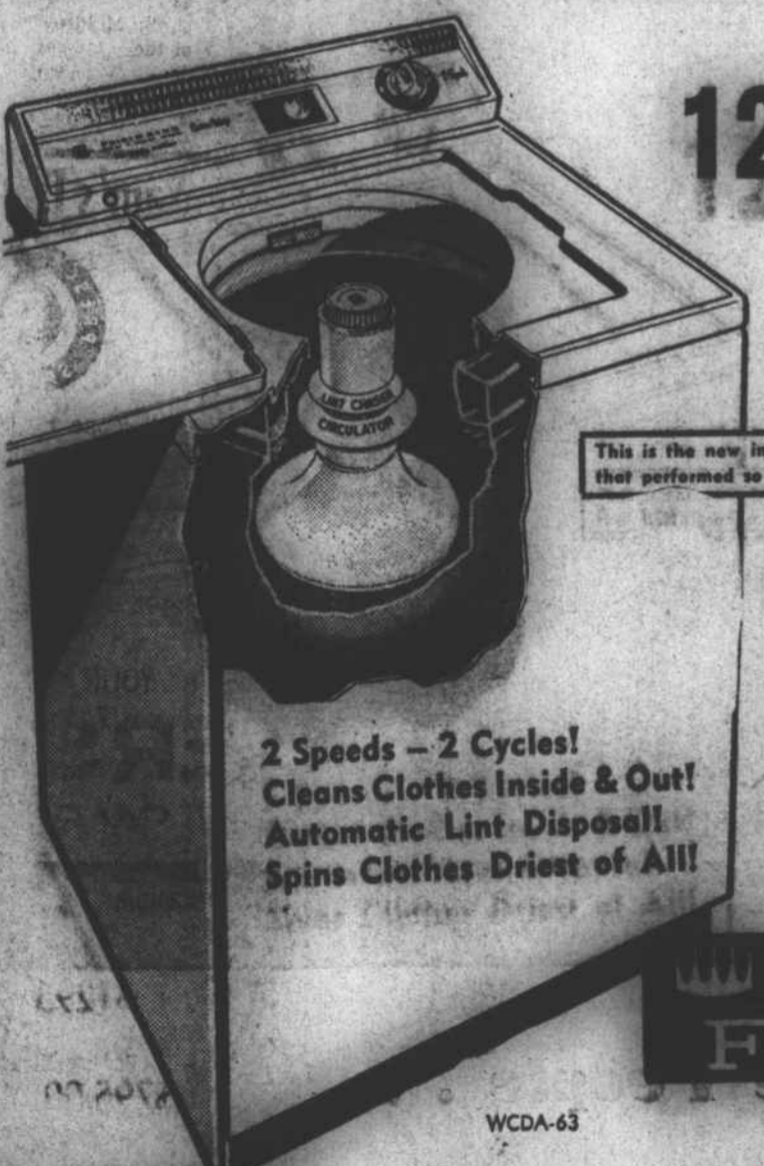

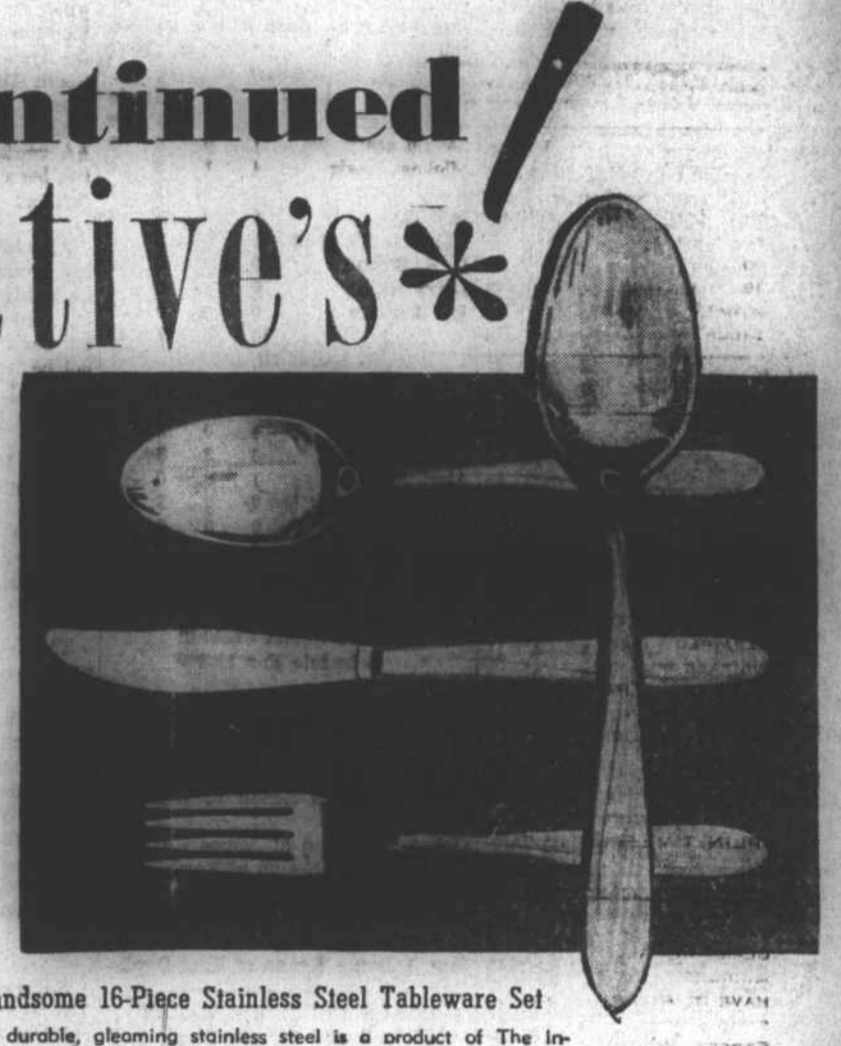
