The Panthers came from behind to win and remain undefeated in conference play. It was the Simpson and Simpson combination that turned what looked like a defeat in the first half to victory. Jerry Simpson, the Panthers' great playmaker and cousin Ricky Batts, teamed together to account for 30 of 33 points. SHERIFF'S STATEMENT
The Duplin County Law Enforcement Association, in co-operation with other local authorities, have

decided to publish the names of all those arrested while attending a dance held in Faison at the Twin Produce building every Saturday night. If teenagers, authorities will notify their parents. This is a new policy of the association and it is an effort to combat drunkenness, boorishness, vandalism, and misconduct which takes place during these dances.

This policy is due to the numerous requests of local citizens, parents in surrounding counties, pastors, and many other persons concerned for the welfare of teenagers who are exposed to improper supervision at this dance.

The purpose of this article is to advise anyone attending this dance who is arrested - that their name may be published in the local paper. Sheriff Edwood Revelle, in a statement to the press here today took a firm stand on the issue by saying, "Since law enforcement officers already supervise inside the building, I would like to say that deputies from the Sheriff's Department will continue to supervise the grounds and they will continue to make proper arrests."

"However," he continued, "We are going to publish the names, with no exception, other than age of those who are arrested beginning this Saturday night, and their parents, if they are teenagers, will be notified as soon as possible after they have been booked."

Sheriff Revelle ended by saying, "I just hope that this new policy will help the situation and the teenagers will take us seriously." Elwood Revelle, Sheriff Duplin Co.
