Children's Party Suggestions from Cadbury

For favors, why not use magic wands made of chocolate finger biscuits and gold stars?

Fasten large gold stars to chocolate finger biscuits. (The cement is made by whipping confectioners' sugar into a little egg white until sticky.) Set wands aside to dry.

For a different dessert, ice cream sandwiches might fill the bill.

Chocolate biscuits in a square pan, frost with a layer of soft ice cream and top with matching biscuits. When frozen, break sandwiches apart and store in plastic bags.

Why not try toasted snowballs?

Roll vanilla ice cream balls in Cadbury Biscuit crumbs and freeze immediately. Serve with chocolate sauce.
