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## 4-H - A Challenge To Leadership

"4-H is a way of life for all who care to travel the 4-H trail," says L. R. Harrill, state 4-H club leader. "It will lead to new challenging experiences, to knowledge that will sharpen the imagination, and to skills that challenge the ingenuity of youth."

Harrill says that during National 4-H Club Week, March 2-9, many girls and boys will be recognized for their outstanding accomplishments in 4-H Club work.

"The great challenge to leadership is a belief in the philosophy that what 4-H does for a boy or a girl is more important than what the boy or girl does for 4-H," adds Harrill. "This was so well defined in a statement by a former 4-H member who is now a college student. The student said, 'Trips, awards, pins, certificates and other material gains become insignificant as I attempt to determine my most noteworthy accomplishment as a local 4-H member. Becoming an asset to my family by acquiring skills, making various improvements about the home, providing skills and valuable knowledge to others through demonstrations and activities are satisfying to me. Consequently, my noteworthy accomplishment as a 4-H member is revealed - the finding of a vocational direction and purpose of my life.'"

"There are many compensations for service to others, but the highest reward for leadership is not what one gives but what he becomes because of it," declares Harrill. "In the role of leadership, we need to remember to be ourselves, to begin where we are, to use our talents and to remember that we cannot live and progress on reflected glory of past achievement. We grow into greatness as we build on past accomplishments."

The local committee will make its presentation to the Board of Directors in the College Auditorium at 4:30 p. m. at a meeting open to the public.

Mt. Olive College, which opened in Mount Olive in 1954, is studying the advisability of relocating in New Bern, but an all-out effort is being made to keep the College in Mount Olive. It is sponsored by the Free Will Baptist State Convention and is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Enrollment for the 1962-63 school year has reached 228.

Games were enjoyed by the group and everyone had a wonderful time helping Sandra celebrate her birthday.

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
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
