WASHINGTON REPORT

The House Ways and Means Committee, for example, has already held extensive hearings on the proposed tax revision bill and will hold many additional weeks of hearing before submitting a bill to the House proper for consideration.

It seems to me that a much better test than the volume of legislation adopted is the soundness of the legislation adopted.

For my part, I would rather Congress look action to provide necessary funds to continue existing programs at present levels, and adopted no new program of all than for us to act so hastily that we overlook glaring flaws in new proposals.

The passage of legislation, however, is only one yardstick for measuring the actual work of Congress. Already approximately 5,000 bills have been introduced in the House alone and assigned to Committees. Virtually all of the Committees and Subcommittees have already held sessions, and within the next few days, we will begin to receive reported bills for action on the floor of the house.

With a \$100 billion budget in the offing, I am sure that the American public is more interested in long and careful committee
