Richard Harper On Music Tour

Richard F. Harper of Albemarle will participate this spring in the largest music tour in the Western United States as member of the great Brigham Young University combined chorus and symphony orchestra. The tour is scheduled April 2-17.

The 400-member group is composed of 300 singers and 100 instrumentalists. It will perform two of the world's great choral masterpieces, "Magnificat in D" by Bach and "Bishazzar's Feast" by Walton.

Ten huge buses will transport the musicians and a moving van will carry the instruments over the 2500-mile tour route. The group will appear in concerts in Las Vegas, Nev.; Bakersfield, Los Angeles and Berkeley, California; and Salt Lake City and Provo, Utah.

Conducting the group in concert on the unprecedented tour will be noted composer-conductor Dr. Crawford Gates. He has been assisted in preparing the group by the BYU Music Department faculty.
