Areas Hit By Floods, Tornadoes

W. D. Dibrell, disaster director for the Red Cross Southeastern Area, reports that at least one third of the approximately 1800 families hit by tornadoes and floods in the past week in four southern states are expected to require recovery aid from the Red Cross, attorney W. C. Gitsman, chairman of Duplin Co. chapter, was advised.

Family relief operations are under way in 18 counties in Tennessee, 9 in Alabama, 5 in Mississippi, and one in Georgia, he said. "Hundreds of families already have applied for help beyond the emergency period," Dibrell said. "The total figure is expected to reach 570 or more. These requests are not only for emergency maintenance, food, clothing and medical care, but also for assistance in reconstruction and returning of homes and small businesses, payment of hospital and medical bills, and other disaster-related expenses. This help will be forthcoming to the extent they need it."

Dibrell said 24 disaster staff members of the national Red Cross are helping local chapters in relief operations.

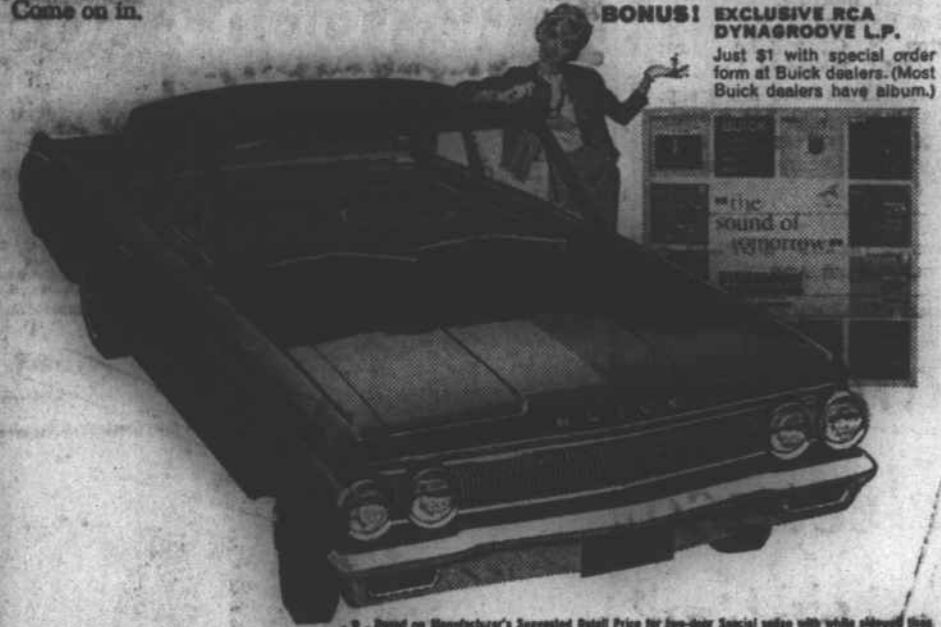

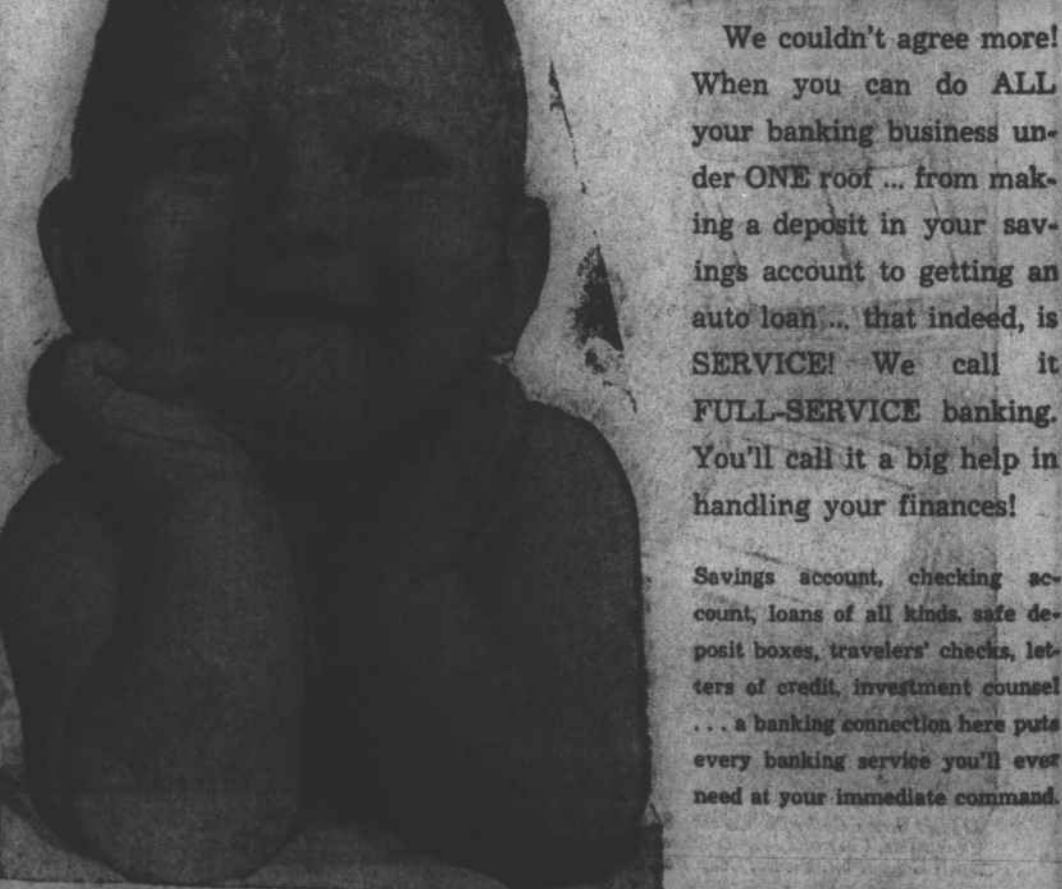
