Farmers with allotments of less than 15 acres will continue to produce their historical share of wheat as provided by the 1964 wheat program according to O. L. As explained by Holland, each farm will have an allotment based on the larger of one computed from the avg. wheat acreage (up to 15 acres in the 3 years 1959-61 or the regular allotment. Wheat grown on farms without a wheat history in these 3 years will be subject to a marketing quota penalty in 1964. The new wheat program will offer

two choices to the farm operator with a 1964 wheat allotment of less than 15 acres:

(1) He may choose to participate in the program as an allotment eligible to vote in the wheat referendum, will qualify for price support, cates will provide a higher rate of on about 80 percent of the normal yield on the allotted acreage. A lower rate of support will be available on the rest of the wheat produced on the farm.) A small grower will also have the opportunity to divert all his allotment to conserv-

The program will become effective if at least two-thirds of the growers vot-
