### Cong. Henderson Participates In Mass Screening

Washington, D. C. Representative David N. Henderson (D-N.C.) volunteered to participate in Alabama's newly developed mass screening technique for the detection of the lung disease, emphysema. The Alabama Emphysema Research Unit was stationed on Capitol Hill, July 22-25 to test all members of the Congress in an effort to stress the need for early detection and treatment of emphysema.

Representative Kenneth Roberts (D-Ala.) was instrumental in bringing the Unit up from Birmingham where it engaged in a statewide survey sponsored by the Alabama Tuberculosis Associations, the Medical College of Alabama, and the Division of Air Pollution of the U. S. Public Health Service. Congressman Roberts and Senator Lister Hill invited all members of the Congress to participate in the survey.

Emphysema, which is characterized by a shortness of breath and which may be disabling and fatal in its later stages, was believed to be relatively rare 10 years ago. Today there are an estimated 10 million victims in the United States. Air pollution and smoking are believed to be the chief contributing causes of emphysema.

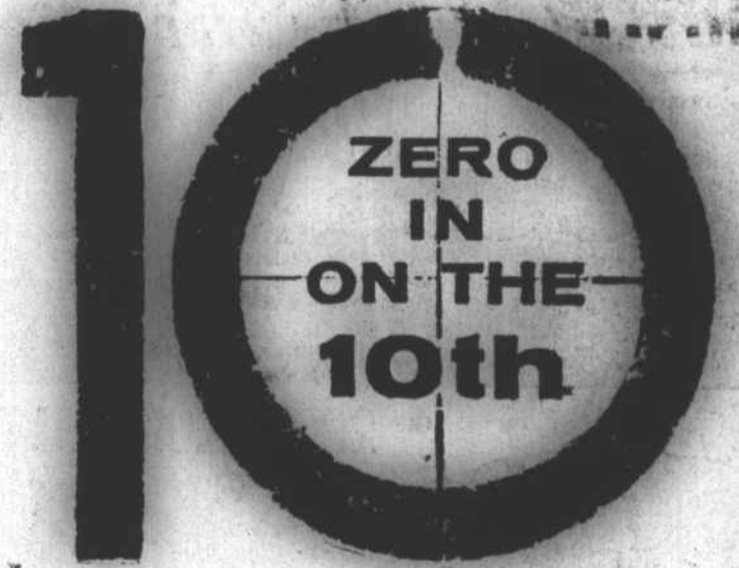
