A Scotland Neck reader writes about her Scuppernong vine: "I have a large flourishing Scuppernong grapevine, about 20 years all, I would say Every year there are a few grapes on it but they never mature, just drop of "All of the older Muscadine varieties." Scuppernong, James, Thomas, Mish and others, are self-unfruitful when planted alone and cross unfruitful when planted to gether. They have normal platis (female parts but their stamens (Male parts) produce as pollen to fertilize the pistils.
