

Wilson Tobacco Market Ready For Opening Date

John E. Beurrell, Supervisor of the Wilson Tobacco Market, is ready to receive tobacco for the opening of the 1963 sales season on Wednesday, August 21, 1963.

All warehouses and factories have been put in tip top shape to sell and process the 1963 tobacco crop. Two new additions to the Market are: I. P. Lorillard Company, Inc. for the first time will have their own buyers following the opening of the market added buyers competition; other words there will be ten buying companies with buyers on each of the five sets instead of nine buying companies with buyers on each of the five sets.
