What Questions Vets Are Asking

Here are representative answers by the Veterans Administration to questions from former servicemen and their families:

Q-Are veterans of World War I entitled to a pension? If they are, is there a required age and do they have to be retired?

A-A pension may be payable to a wartime veteran, regardless of age, if he is totally and permanently disabled not as a result of his military service. The veteran must be unable to pursue a gainful occupation by reason of such disability, and his income from all sources must be under certain statutory limits. Details to fit an individual case are available at any VA office.

Q-I have been told that anyone entitled to use the word "G.I." is entitled to veterans' benefits. Is this right and what does "G.I." mean?

A-The term "G.I." might be defined as "government issue" and referred to varied supplies, equipment, clothing, etc., issued to individuals or units in the service. In time it became a slang term referring to the servicemen themselves. It has not standing as an

CHICKEN A LA KING ON CRISPY BISCUITS

Makes 3 servings

Crusty Biscuits:
One 12-oz. pkg. (3 cups) Pillsbury's Corn Muffin Mix
1 egg
1/3 cup milk

Chicken a la King:
1/3 cup butter or margarine
One 4-oz. can mushroom stems and pieces, drained
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash pepper
1-1/8 cups chicken broth
1/2 cup cut-up cooked chicken

Heat oven to hot (400° F.). Empty contents of corn muffin mix package into bowl. Add egg and milk. Blend only until dry ingredients are thoroughly moistened. Drop by tablespoonfuls onto a greased cookie sheet. Bake in preheated oven (400° F.) about 15 minutes.

While biscuits are baking, prepare Chicken a la King. Melt butter in saucepan. Lightly brown mushrooms and green pepper in butter. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Add broth gradually, stirring constantly until thickened. Add chicken and heat thoroughly.

Split biscuits in half horizontally. Spoon on Chicken a la King.
