

Mount Olive Boys And Girls Only Undeclared In East Central

Mount Olive's Panthers took a doubleheader from the James Kenan Tigers Friday night in the huge Kenanville Gym. The Panthers retained their undefeated status as well as retaining their lead in the East Central 2-A Conference.

Couch Dave McClenny's girls won their 35 straight game without a lost defeating the Tiger girls 40-16. McClenny's highly regarded girls have won 52 of their last 53 ball games. They have won the last three Wayne County tournaments and county championship. Over the past three years the tall Panthers Lassies have lost only three games out of sixty - six.

The Tiger girls led by Peggy Lanier with 7 points made it look like a real game in the first half. Lanier fouled out at the half and the lead was to heavy for the other two scorers Jean Cavanaugh and Becky Oakley. The real heartbreaker was very exciting as the much shorter James Kenan girls failed to chalk up by four points in the second half.

Mary Dell Barwick and Danna Lee out scored the Kenan team, while leading the undefeated Panthers with 18 and 19 points respectively.

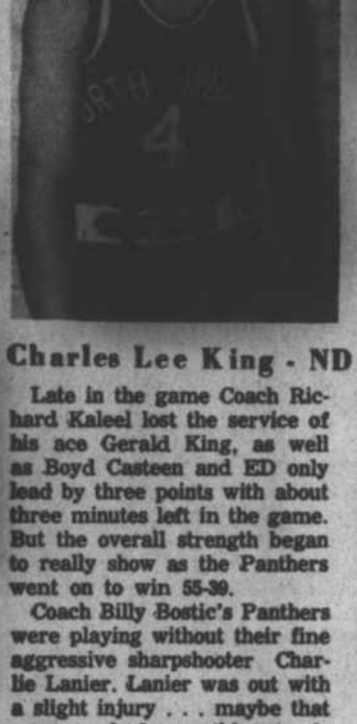

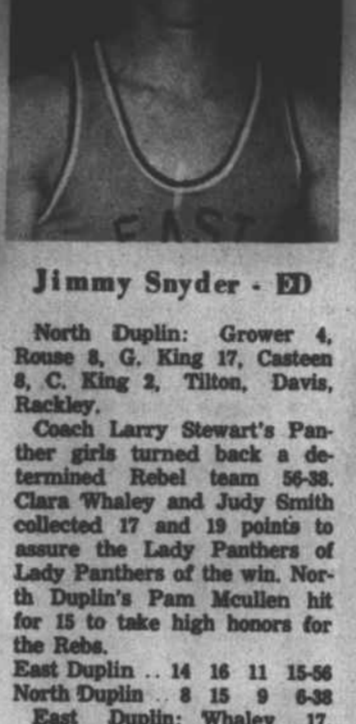

The project is part of Carolina Telephone's 1964 program for expansion and improvement and will cost about \$8,000.00

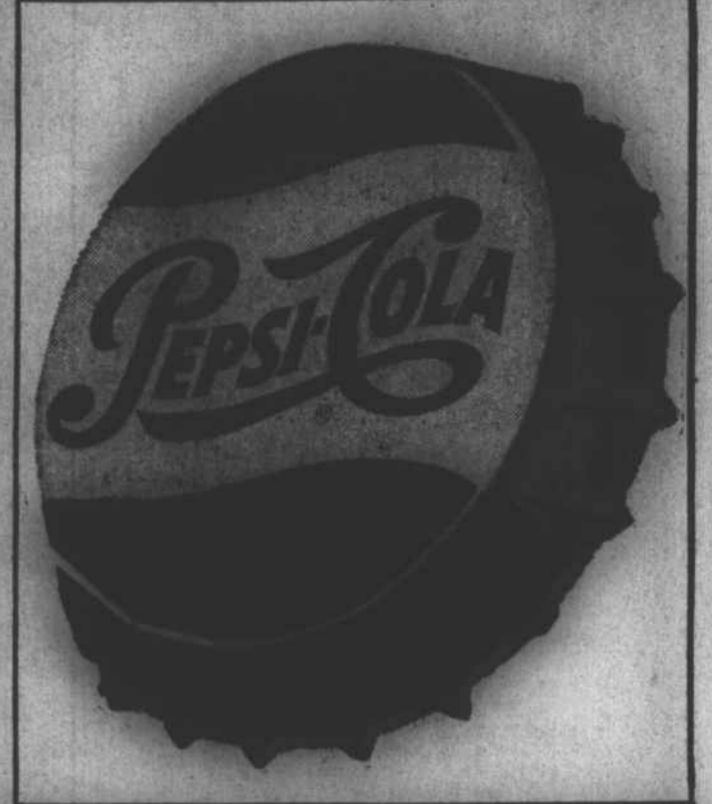
