The automobile according to the patrolman, was operated by Cottle, sliced under the trailer of the heavy truck, shearing the top off the automobile almost to the trunk. The patrolman said the front of the car was sticking out on the opposite side of the trailer.

Cottle died instantly and Mozingo died two hours later in Duplin General Hospital in Kenansville. The accident happened about 1:45 a.m.

The Ramsey Feed Co., truck was driven by William David Bell, Jr., 31 of near Beulaville. Burler quotes Bell as saying that he had backed the truck across the highway and was in the process of pulling a passenger auto from the roadside ditch when the crash occurred. The driver of the car in the ditch was identified as Will Davis, 68, colored, of Wilmington. Neither Bell nor Davis were injured.

Bell was given a prelimin-ary hearing Sunday before R. F. Powell, Justice of the Peace, and bound over to the May term of Superior Court, under a \$1,000 bond, on a charge of manslaughter.

Coroner Hector McNeill conducted an inquest Tuesday night in the Rose Hill Town Hall and the jury recommended that Bell be held for Grand Jury action under bond.

New Withholding Rates

The Internal Revenue Service announced today that all wage salary payments made on or after March 5 should reflect the new lower withholding rates established by the Revenue Act of 1964 signed by President Johnson Wednesday evening.

J. E. Wall, Director of Internal Revenue, said that his office will follow a rule of reason in enforcing the March 5 effective date. No fault will be found with employers who are delayed a day or two in putting the lower rate into effect by problems encountered in converting their payroll systems.

The withholding tables employers should use in applying the 14 per cent withholding rate were mailed to some four and one-half million employers on February 10. This advance mailing was designed to give employers lead-time in making the payroll changes required. Employers who have not received the "Employer's Tax Guide," Circular E, which shows the new rates may obtain a copy at Internal Revenue District offices,
