Catch-Up Friday

62 1/2% In Duplin Get Dose

Where was Duplin Sunday? She was there!

It was sugar-sucking day. Dr. Guy V. Gooding, president of the Duplin County Medical Society, says that 19,040 men, women and children sucked, crunched and swallowed the tiny vaccine-doused sugar cubes that gave immunization to Type I of the once dread polio disease.

There were nine well organized and manned clinics conducted by the doctors of the county, and people came to all of them early — immediately after the county's churches ended services at noon — and they kept coming all afternoon.

There will be a catch-up clinic at the Health Office in Kenansville, according to Dr. Gooding, on Friday from 1 to 5 p. m. The vaccine can be used for a week after it is thawed and will be administered as long as the supply lasts Friday afternoon on a first-come first-served basis.

Hundreds flocked to their family doctor Monday for their vaccine-soaked cube, and hundreds, having already received their first type a month ago, went out of the county Sunday for the second dose.

Counting all, it is estimated that some 25,000 or 82 1/2% of the population of Duplin, has now received Strain I of the Sabin vaccine.

Strain II will be given May 17, at which time a larger number of people are expected to make the sweet trip to the medicine shop. Strain III will be given in Duplin next fall.

The doctors of the county are to be commended for making the oral vaccine available to a health-conscious people. Doctors, pharmacists, nurses and civic organizations, along with many teen-agers who acted as clerks and filled out records, etc., donated their assistance and time in conducting the clinics, which were well organized and conducted and appreciated.

Saturday Sale Money Orders Discontinued

Duplin post offices will discontinue the sale of money orders on Saturday, effective May 4. The rural carriers will not accept applications for money orders on Saturday. All window service will be discontinued on Sunday.

Postmaster Elma P. Drew at Magnolia advises that this limited adjustment in some postal services was ordered in Washington March 10 by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski to save \$12.7 million and will take effect in Magnolia and other post office on May 4.

Mrs. Drew emphasized that no essential major services are affected under the orders. There will be no change in special delivery. Parcel post will be delivered as heretofore. Letters and other first-class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever.

The economy step, Mrs. Drew explained, is in line with President Johnson's programs under which the recent Federal income tax cut was provided.

Postmaster Bostic at Beulaville advises that window service at that office will be limited to four hours on Saturday, from 8 to 12 noon. Some services such as inquiries, claims, information, meter setting, box rent collections, etc. will be closed on Saturday, but patrons can purchase stamps and mail parcels.

Some offices will not deliver, except by rural carrier, parcels on Wednesday, others on Thursday. Patrons should inquire at their post offices for the new schedule necessary to meet this economy move.

First-grader Killed By School Bus

Mary Ann Cullow, a first-grader at the Kenansville Elementary School, and a resident of the Summerlin Crossroads section of Duplin, was crushed to death underneath a school bus on the school grounds Thursday.

Patrolman W. W. Kellum, the investigating officer, says that the school bus had stopped on the school grounds to discharge the pupils about 8:10 a. m. The little Outlaw girl was next to the last pupil to get off the bus and when the driver, according to the driver, saw the last pupil clear the front of the bus, he thought the way was clear and started forward with the bus. However, the Outlaw girl had bent down to pick up a book and the driver says that he could not see her. The left front wheel of the vehicle ran over the little girl crushing her in the pelvic area. She was taken to Duplin General Hospital where she died about 11:30 a. m.

The bus was driven by Jimmy Gray Goodman, Route 2, Mount Olive, who is 18 years of age, and a senior at James Kenan High School near Kenansville.

The six-year old child was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Outlaw of Route 2, Mt. Olive.

Funeral services were conducted Friday at 3 p. m. at the Rooty Branch Free Will Baptist Church by the Rev. Lemuel Taylor. Burial was in the Summerlin Family Cemetery at Summerlin's Crossroads.

Survivors, in addition to the parents, include a sister, Betty Ruth, of the home; the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John Outlaw of Mount Olive and the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Summerlin of Kenansville.

Z. W. Frazelle is principal of the Kenansville school. This is the first death caused by a school bus in Duplin County. It has long been a rule that school buses are not to move backward on school grounds in Duplin because of poor visibility. It is understood that the school principals have now adopted a rule that no school bus can move forward except on signal to the driver by a person who can see the front of the vehicle. At some schools, teachers supervise the loading and unloading of the buses.

Patrolman Kellum says that investigation of this accident is being continued.

Nurses Assoc Scholarship

District No. 27 of the N.C. State Nurses Association, is comprised of Duplin and Pender County.

RN nurses interested in Health Care programs of the county and realizing the critical shortage of nurses in this rural area decided to set up a scholarship fund for an eligible student each year who is interested in Registered Nurses School.

At the end of her training period, the organization prefers that the recipient work in the hospital in the county for 1 year. otherwise she will have to pay back the loan in full.

At the present time, the organization has a membership of 30 from Duplin County and 2 members from Pender Public Health Department. It is hoped that within the next year every active registered nurse in Pender and Duplin will see the importance of being a member of this organization, one of the leaders said.

At the present time every RN and LPN on the staff at Duplin General are members. All of the Duplin Public Health nurses except one and the majority of office nurses and relief or private duty nurses are members.

One colored RN from Duplin County is at present with Public Health Service in Viet Nam and still maintains her membership in the District organization.

Dist. HD Clubs Meet

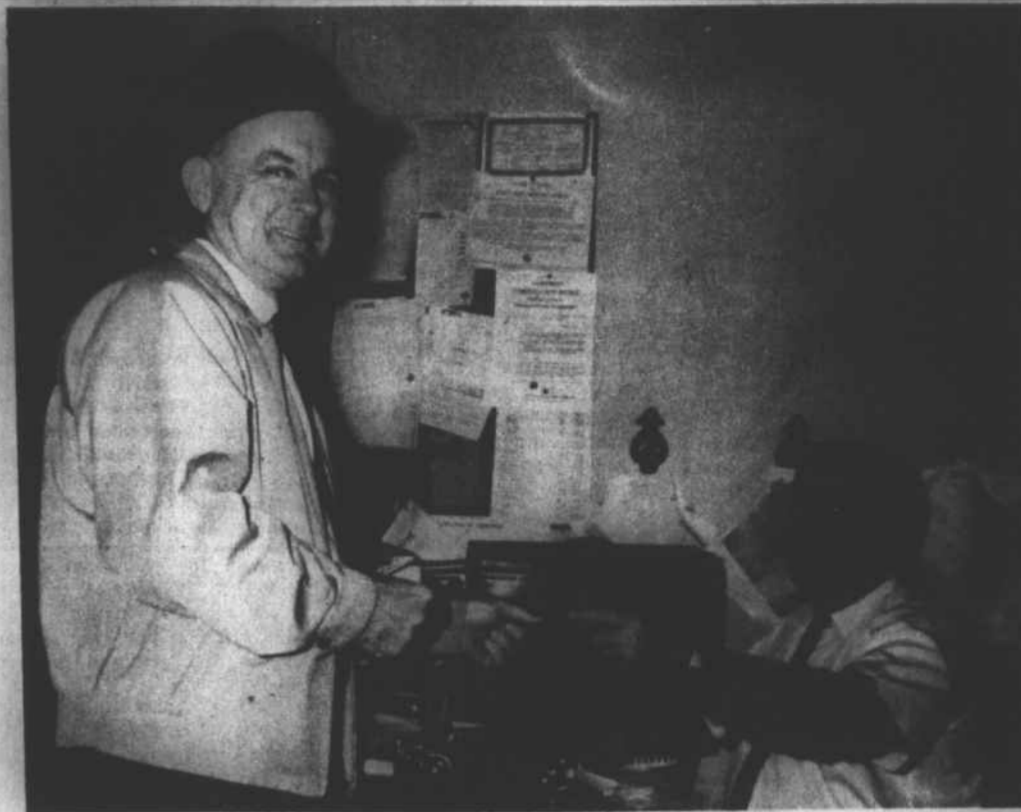

J. M. Smith, Chinquapin, Chairman of the Duplin County Board of Elections, was watching the clock intently Friday and when both hands pointed up he closed his book and registration for the May 30th primary ended.

The last candidate to register was William H. (Bill) Fussell, fertilizer and farm supplies dealer and life-long Democrat and resident of Rose Hill, who filed as a candidate for commissioner for Dist. 5, composed of Rose Hill, Magnolia and Kenansville.

When the books closed, 72 candidates had planked down their filing fee and indicated the office to which they aspire. Only one Republican registered, Samuel E. Godwin of Warsaw filed as a candidate for the Legislature. Hugh S. Johnson, Jr., the incumbent, and Butler M. Cavenaugh are candidates for the Democratic nomination as a Member of the House.
