

### Rose Hillian "Man Of Many Hats"

A three-year tour at Naval Supply Center, Norfolk, Virginia, ends May 18 when CDR H. L. Bland, 110 West Main Street, Rose Hill, transfers to the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts, Washington, D. C., as Director of Personnel Planning Division.

Reporting to the Center in June 1961, he wore three hats for 18 months as Stock Control Division Officer, technical assistant in IC&FD for aviation and Officer in Charge of the Aviation Material Office.

In January 1963, he began a 13-month tour as senior analyst on BuSanda's Central Analysis Committee. This Committee was responsible for detailed systems design for the Uniform Automatic Data Processing System for Navy Stock Points. The only military member of this Committee, CDR Bland was commended by Admiral Crumpacker & Chief of the Bureau.

Later, CDR Bland assumed the responsibilities of Fiscal Division Officer and in May 1963 put on the second hat of Disbursing Officer. During his tour with this Division, the Navy Area Audit Office and the Supply Corps Inspector General singled out Fiscal's efforts and commended them as "outstanding."

His major collateral duty

since March of last year has been to serve as the Center's Bond Officer. Additional responsibilities have included senior membership on the Fifth Naval District Audit Board, holding the post of treasurer for the Navy Relief Society, serving as chairman of the 1963 Armed Forces Day Speech Bureau, and representing NSC with this Bureau.

He also has been active with the Naval Supply Center Golf Association and was a member of the NSC Officers Bowling Team which took top honors in the 5ND league last season.

He was president of the Poplar Hills PTA and served on the Norfolk Safety Council and the Mace Club. Active in his church, he served on the Board of Deacons and taught Sunday School at Coleman Place Presbyterian Church.

The commander is the innovator of a safety flag program which was first started at Poplar Hills School. The flag is flown beneath the American flag and the students must earn the right to display it by maintaining a perfect accident-free record. So successful was this new program, it has recently been adopted by Norfolk City and Safety Councils for city-wide implementation.

The commander and his wife, Stella, daughter of Mrs. Estelle Moore Carr and the late Dr. Ransom L. Carr of Rose Hill, have a daughter, Cathy, who will be 10 years of age in July.

Commander Low Bland is the son of Mrs. H. E. Bland and the late Mr. Bland of Jeffersonville, Indiana.
