BEULAVILLE MAN DIES IN ACCIDENT

JACKSONVILLE - A 32 yearold Beulaville motorist was fatally injured Sunday after his car ran off a rural road about four miles south of here. Two passengers in the car received minor injuries.

Dead on arrival at Onslow Memorial Hospital, said High-way Patrolman D. M. Stephens, was Benjamin J. Judge of Beulaville Route 1.

Stephens said Judge's car, traveling at an excessive rate of speed, bowled over three mail boxes and crashed headon into a tree after it failed to negotiate a turn on rural road 1113 about 10:30 p. m.

Stephens said the crash impact caused Judge's body to bend the steering wheel. The windshield, he said, was also shattered by the heads of the two passengers, who were rid-ing in the front seat.

Released after treatment for head injuries and lacerations was William H. James, 51, of Jacksonville Route 3, and Thelma Watkins, 33, of Jacksonville Route 4. She also lost a tooth in the accident, Stephens said. The officer said the car was totally demolished.
