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# DAN MOORE . . . FOR GOVERNOR

**REA:** Dan Moore has stated many times that he is from a rural area served by REA, understands its problem, and feels that there is ample room in North Carolina for both REA and private power companies to operate. He has said that he will do nothing to impair the operation of REA facilities.


The civil rights bill and all its section are deemed unconstitutional by Judge Moore.
