PINK HILL POST OFFICE BID LET

Approval bids for construction of the new Pink Hill Post Office have been issued by the U. S. Post Office Department, according to a recent announcement by Rep. L. H. Fountain. It will be located on Walnut (Beulaville Highway) and Broadway (Main St.) and will embrace 13,000 sq. feet. The interior will be 94 square feet with a 3,000-foot platform and adequate parking space.

The structure, to be completed by November 1964, will cost an estimated \$13,500, according to Rep. Fountain.
