The Duplin County Health Department nurses are in the process of completing the county wide Tuberculin skin test ing program in all of the first and ninth grades. The Tuberculosis Association purchased the tuberculin tine test.

The children with positive tuberculin test will be x-rayed at the Health Department and followed if necessary by the public health nurse in her area. The families of the children with positive skin test will also be x-rayed if they are 14 yrs. or over and the children under 14 years will be skin tested and if positive will be x-ray-

The x-ray clinic is held every Wednesday from 1:00 to 4:00 p. m. The first graders were chosen because they have recently left home situations and this is a good means to find new undected tuberculosis cases. The ninth graders were chosen because they are in the adolescent group and this age group is more susceptible to tuberculosis
