The Annual Art Show sponsored by James Sprunt Institute and the Tar Heel Fine Arts Society will be held Sunday, May 22, from 3 to 6 p.m., at the Jack Cooper home 2 miles south of Rose Hill on highway 117. The Cooper home is a picturesque colonial structure in a grove of pine trees. It makes an appropriate setting for art exhibits. The colorful exhibits will be displayed in Mrs. Cooper's studio as well as out of doors.

Exhibits will consist of oils, watercolors, pastels, pen and pencil sketches, portraits, and ceramics displays. There will be works by area artists, including Jack Berkman of Wilmington, an established professional artist. There will also be numerous amateur displays by students from James Sprunt Institute's art and ceramics classes.

These student groups have been studying under Tempe Gardner, Margaret Cooper, Ione Griesel, James Sanders, Margaret Blanchard and Nina Brice.

The show is expected to attract a large crowd of interested spectators. In addition to a variety of fine displays, several artists will be doing paintings during the afternoon. Organ music will be furnished by a professional musician.
