Waccamaw Splits Bank Stock

WHITEVILLE - Waccamaw Bank and Trust Company announced today that the Board of Directors had voted a split in bank stock subject to a special call meeting of stockholders later this month.

The announcement said the stock would increase outstanding shares from 230,000 to 460,000 and means that par value of the stock would be reduced from \$10 to \$5, and each shareholder would receive one additional share for each share he holds now.

The change in the stock, it was reported, would put the par value and the market value of the stock more in line with other stock and would be more attractive to investors.

The Waccamaw showed strong gains on June 30, 1966 over 1965. Deposits were up over 13 per cent, or a dollar increase of over five million dollars. Total resources are up 13 per cent and total \$49,970,757 as compared to \$44,242,967 of June 30, 1965.

Earnings for the first half of 1966 amounted to \$1.24 per share, based on shares out-

standing as of June 30th. Waccamaw paid its shareholders a 10 per cent stock dividend in March of this year.

Earnings have kept pace in spite of the sharp increase in interest paid for savings. Interest paid for the first six months of 1966 was 14 per cent greater than for the same period last year and totaled \$409,966.

New or remodeling of facilities are either underway or planned for Kenansville, Shallotte, Chadbourne, Whiteville, Firmont, and a Television Drive in unit will be in operation in Lumberton by September 1st. Waccamaw operates 21 offices in 15 towns and will merge with The Commercial Bank of Dunn later this year.

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Cotton Plant Dedication At Clinton On Friday

Clinton - The world's most modern cotton yarn spinning plant will be dedicated here Friday, July 15.

Beaunit Textiles, a division of the Beaunit Corporation, will formally dedicate its \$4 million Clinton plant in ceremonies high lighted by addresses from Gov. Dan K. Moore and Beaunit president Irwin S. Meltzer.

The 120,000 square-foot air-conditioned building, where production began last October, will be open to the general public the next day, Saturday, July 16.

Clinton Plant Manager R. Alan Welch said that more than 450 state officials, textile executives and visiting dignitaries have been invited to attend the dedicatory service.

Among those expected are Sen. B. Everett Jordan, Rep. David N. Henderson; J. W. York, chairman of the board of directors of the N. C. Department of Conservation and Development; C&D director Dan Stewart; officers of Daniel Construction Co., and officials of Saco-Lowell Shops.

The building was erected by the Danile Company at a cost of \$1.5 million with an additional \$2.5 million spent on the equipment development by Saco-Lowell, a division of the Marmont Corp.

"This plant represents the first time that fully automated equipment has been joined as a producing unit to achieve the ultimate in modern textile production," Welch said.

In continuous operation--three shifts daily seven days a week--Beaunit's Clinton plant

and its 150-plus employees will process approximately 330 five-hundred pound bales of cotton weekly.

Employing and training more than 95 percent of its force in the Clinton area, Beaunit provides a payroll of about \$750,000 annually to the community economy.

When production began last year, the plant ran at 102 percent of its predicted capacity Welch said; since early this year production has averaged nearly 95 percent.

The dedication ceremonies will be conducted at the plant, beginning at noon on the 15th.

Following the address by Gov. Moore, whose February 1965 announcement disclosed Beaunit's plans for an operation here, a luncheon will be attended by the guests. A tour of the plant will conclude the day's activities.

The plant will be open for public tours on Saturday from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m.
