Soil Test Now For Fall Seeded Crops

Soil test now for fall seed-ings urges Duplin County Ex-tension Chairman, Vernon H. Reynolds, Ladino Clover, Alfalfa, Red Clover, Fescue, Orchard grass and Small Grains are usually planted during the early fall season. Usually, fall seeding of these crops results in better stands and more vigorous growth the next summer. Most of these crops will be on

To set the stage for high yields during the years that follow, it is important to build up the lime and phosphorus level in the soil prior to seeding. Nei-ther lime or phosphorus move much from point of application in the soil, consequently, it is highly important that they be mixed into the soil to plow depth where root activity is greatest, Surface applied lime and phosphorus is much less ef-ficiently used than when mixed into the soil.
