Soil Test Now For Fall Seeded Crops

Soil test now for fall seedings urges Duplin County Extension Chairman, Vernon H. Reynolds, Ladino Clover, Alfalfa, Red Clover, Fescue, Orchard grass and Small Grains are usually planned during the early fall season. Usually, fall seeding of these crops results in better stands and more vigorous growth the next summer. Most of these crops will be on the land for two or more years. To set the stage for high yields during the years that follow, it is important to build up the lime and phosphorus level in the soil prior to seeding. Neither lime or phosphorus move much from point of application in the soil, consequently, it is highly important that they be mixed into the soil to plow depth where root activity is greatest. Surface applied lime and phosphorus is much less efficiently used than when mixed into the soil.

If practical, lime should be applied a few months prior to planting. Lime reduces acidity more rapidly when it is thoroughly mixed with the soil. Lime dissolves slowly so, when practical, it should be applied a few months prior to planting. Duplin County Extension Chairman, V. H. Reynolds, states that soil sampling supplies and instructions for sampling fields or soil can be obtained from his office in Kenansville as well as from Vocational Agricultural teachers, the Soil Conservation Service, and representatives of the Fertilizer industry.

Mrs. Hill suggested a study of Canada for the year.

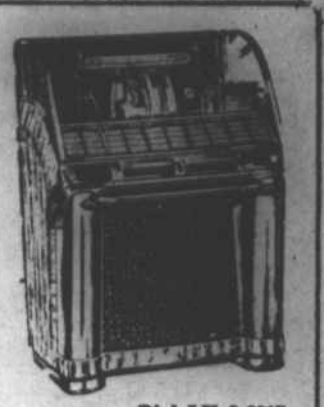
The August recreation was planned for the group to have supper together at "Hussey's Barbecue" near Seven Springs. August 20 at 6:30 p.m.
