JAMES SPRUNT APPROVED FOR VETERANS TRAINING


Eligible veterans will be interested to know that they may further their education at James Sprunt Institute, The anm more W. Johnson, State Super-visor for Veterans Education, North Carolina Department of Public Instruction. Six degree programs in Bu-siness, Agricultural, and Spe-cial Technology, along with 10 Vocational Diploma Curricula, are available to veterans under Title 38, U.S. Code. Benefits to full-time students under the veterans program ranges from \$100 per month for single veterans through \$150 for veterans with two or more dependents.

gnosed, your physician has a choice of a variety of drugs, such as streptomycin and iso-niazid, which effectively sup-

niazid, which effectively sup-press the germs while the body builds up its own immunity. Children under five are a "high risk" group because of the frequent and close associa-tions with their parents, rela-tives, household help and baby sitners, any of whom may be carriers. carriers.

Everyone should have an an-mual check-up in the form of a skin test or chest X-ray. These tests are available free in most areas any time of the year. Local public health officers and the local chapters of the Na-tional Tuberculosis Association will direct you to TB detection

will direct you to TB detection centers in your area. The skin tests are simple and pain-less. If one of these indicates TB germs are present, it doesn't necessarily mean the germs are doing damage. It takes an x-ray and spurum test, along with blood and urine stu-dies, to determine accurately whether the bacilli are active. whether the bacilli are active.



people seem to think that one or two sprayings during the growing season are all that are necessary. On the contrary, this battle against insects and diseases is never-ending. For this reason it is best to follow a regular spray program for all of your ornamentals, fruits and vegetables. There are many effective sp-ray chemicals available -some for sucking insects, oth-ers for insects that chew their food and some combination materials which are effective aterials which are effective a-gainst both types. Mix all materials according to instructions given on the containers. This will insure proper concentration. Observe safety measures: by not in-haling spray or dust; by wash-ing hands with soap and water; by storing out of reach of chill-dren and pets. Observe residue dren and pets. Observe residue tolerances permitted on vege-table crops by using the dif-ferent chemicals as recom-
