A nearby resident said he first saw the stones about two weeks ago, but thought someone would probably come for them.

Two of the stones have been broken, apparently they did not fall from a traveling vehicle as there is no evidence that they hit the pavement at any time. There is a slight indentation on one stone as if a chain might have left its mark.

Duplin County Historical Society Organized Thursday

The site for the organizational meeting of the Duplin County Historical Society was the Country Squire on Highway 24, Thursday October 20th at 1 o'clock. Nineteen persons attended.

The meeting was called to order by John Nick Kalmar. The first order of business was a Resolution by Mr. Faison W. McGowan stating that Duplin County needs an Historical Society and that such an organization be formed immediately.

This was seconded by Mrs. J. W. Farrior and passed.

Mr. Preston B. Ralford made the motion that John Nick Kalmar be elected temporary Chairman of the organization, Mrs. Woodrow W. Blackburn temporary secretary and Mr. Faison W. McGowan treasurer. This motion carried.

The meeting was then suspended for lunch. After lunch the meeting was called to order and a nominating committee was appointed for selecting officers of the organization. Those appointed to the nominating Committee were: Mrs. Russell Lanier, Vance Gavin, Walter P. West, Mrs. Irene S. Carroll, and Mrs. J. S. Blair.

Mr. Kalmar then appointed a Constitution and By Laws Committee who were: Mr. F. W. McGowan, Mrs. Gardner Edwards, Mrs. F. D. Taylor, Mrs. J. W. Farrior and E. C. Thompson, III. He also suggested that the Constitution and By-Laws of the North Carolina Historical Society be used as a guide in drawing up this Constitution and By-Laws which is to be presented at the next meeting for acceptance.

Mr. Preston B. Ralford made the motion that dues for the organization be one dollar to join and one dollar per year. This motion was seconded and carried. Mr. F. W. McGowan made the statement that the treasurer of the Duplin County Historical Association which produced the pagemat, "The Duplin Story," had the amount of \$38.00 in the bank which would be turned over to the Duplin County Historical Society.
