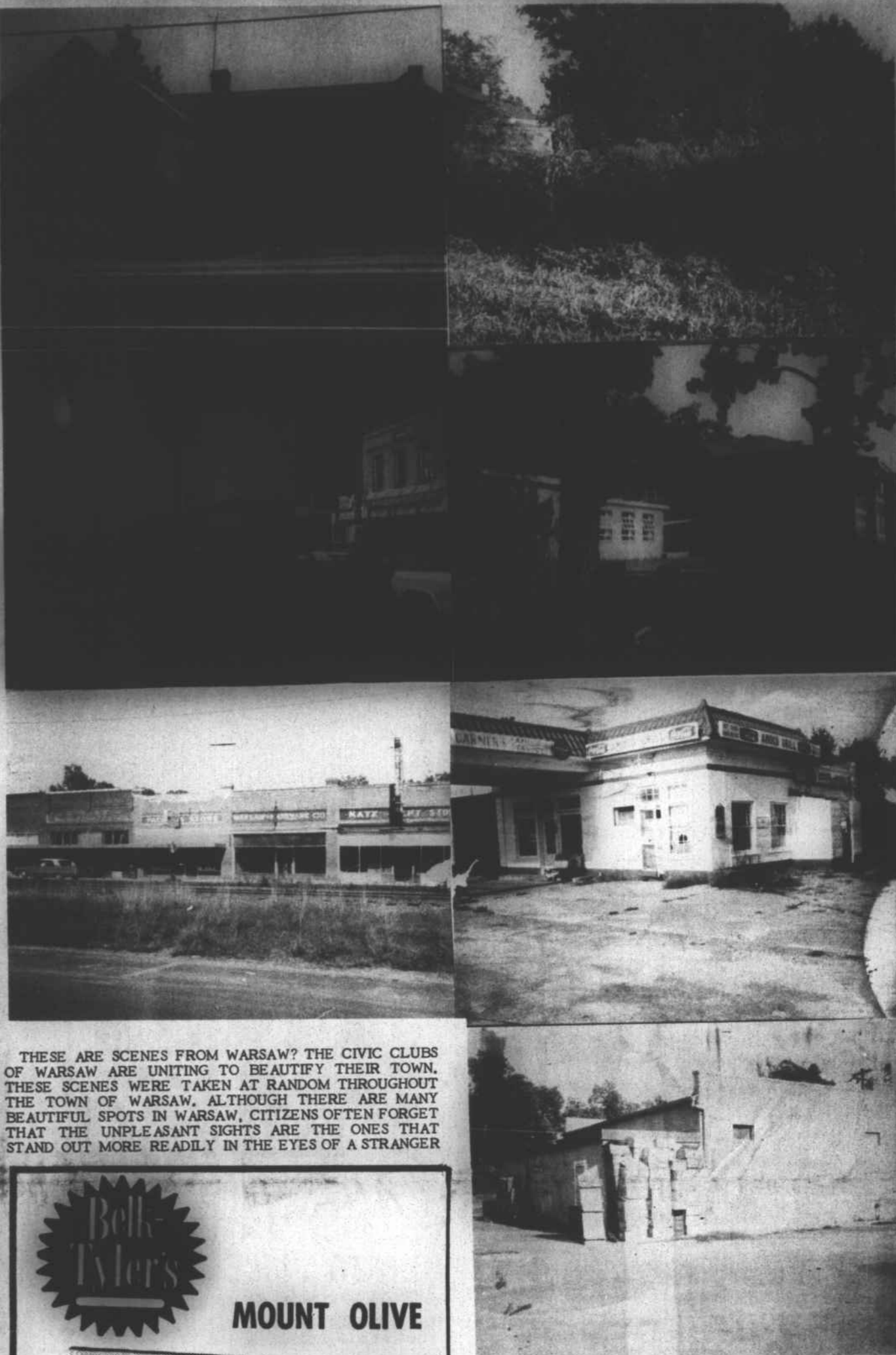
MRS. SOPHRONIE G. BRADSHAW

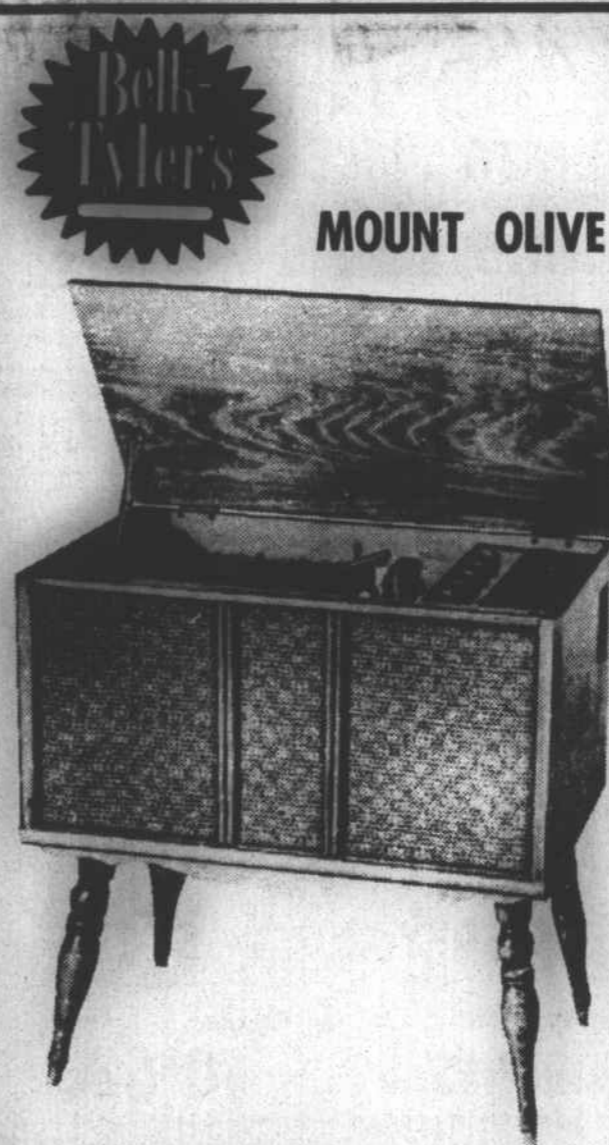
