Doctors at The Center are members of the County Medical Society and are giving of their time and effort to aid in the early finding of Cancer. This examination is limited to the five areas of the body where Cancer is most easily found, and more readily curable These five areas reveal a significant percentage of all Cancer. It does not include blood pressure, weight, or spe-cimens, because they do not directly relate to the detection of Cancer, and too your family doctor is in a better position to judge the changes when you go for your annual check-up.

After the examination a letter

indicating any unusual condi-tions will be sent to your family physician along with recom-mendations of the staff. If the physician in the Detection Cen-ter finds a condition that he feels, needs further study, he may want you to have a special examination in the Diagnostic Center where there are specia-lists available in all fields. Groups and individuals are

urged to make appointments as soon as possible at the Cancer Center. The Hospital will be moving into its new facilities soon, and it is not known if arrangements will be made for the Cancer Center to continue after that time. Mrs. Ward Returns From 4-H Leader Forum




