Nation's Top Farmers Plan Raleigh Meeting

Management problems of the nation's top farmers will be the subject of a symposium in Raleigh on January 18 and 19.

Sponsored by the Top Farmers of America Association and North Carolina State University, the symposium will be the first of its type ever held in the United States.

Farmers are expected from nearly every state east of the Mississippi. They will hear some of the top authorities in the state and nation on farm business affairs.

Topics to be covered will include labor relations, the futures market, national and international agricultural trends and retirement systems for farm people.

Lt. Gov. Robert Scott will welcome the group to North Carolina at a banquet on Thursday, January 18. Dr. Earl Butz, former dean of agriculture at Purdue University, will deliver the banquet address.

Other out-of-state speakers will include John Strohm of Woodstock, Ill., agricultural publisher; Robert Liebenow, president of Corn Refiners Association, Washington, D. C.; Karl F. Heimke, vice president, Chicago Mercantile Exchange; Dr. Marvin Skadberg, livestock marketing economist, Iowa State University; Lee Schuster, farmer of Grower, Mo.; Dr. L. H. Brown, farm management specialist, Michigan State University; Martin Procyet, tax attorney, New York City; and Clifford Ganschow, agricultural editor, Woodstock, Ill.

Participants from North Carolina State University will include Chancellor John T. Caldwell; Dr. H. Brooks James, dean of the School of Agriculture and Life Sciences; and J. C. Williamson, assistant director for agricultural marketing research and extension.
