It Is Girl Scout Cookie Time

It is Girl Scout cookie time again. This is a project by Girl Scouts for Girl Scouts as they help provide funds for their camping program.

Camping is a vital part of the Girl Scout program, and it provides the fun and adventure girls want and need. We operate two established camps - Trallies near Goldsboro and Pretty Pond near Wilmington. Camp Hardee near Chocowinity, Camp Wright near Writingsville Beach, and the Kinston Cabin are available for troop camping all year. Day camps held for many towns provide camping close to girls' homes, and the Day Camp Program is being expanded each year.

While funds for the administration of Girl Scouting come from United Funds, Community Chests, and Girl Scouts Drives, the camping program must be largely self-supporting. Most of the profit from the cookie sale (from each package of cookies our Girl Scouts sell) goes directly toward major renovation and replacements, new buildings and equipment for camping, and special camping events for girls. Five cents of the profit per package goes directly to each girl's troop fund as its bonus for helping with this important council project.

This year we will sell five different kinds of Girl Scout cookies - assorted sandwich, mint, butter-flavored shorties, peanut butter, and Koko Kookie. The price is fifty cents (\$0.50) per package.

Girl Scouts will begin selling on Friday, February 16, and the sale lasts two weeks. Girls collect money at the time of sale and do not take advance orders.

We believe that the cookie sale offers good training for the Girl Scouts. We hope that through participation the girls will receive helpful experience in selling and gain from it a sense of responsibility and achievement. All who help with the sale in any way are helping provide better programs for all girls in our council, and we appreciate this co-operation.

There will be booths in Wallace, Faison, and Kenansville on Saturday, February 24 for the sale of the cookies. Everyone will have an opportunity to support the Girl Scouts.
