Mrs. Harper Busy Candidate

Southport - Mrs. Margaret Harper, the first woman candidate for Lt. Governor of North Carolina said this week that, during her first month on the campaign trail, she has encountered no opposition that appears to be based upon the fact that she is a woman.

"Strangely enough," she said, "some of my most substantial support has come from men."

"There appears to be more interest in the things I stand for and what I propose should be done about them," she explained. "When I tell those I meet that I am greatly interested in education, they want to know where I would propose to get the money with which to raise teacher pay, and if I would favor an increase in taxes."

"My answer to the pair of questions is that I do not favor an increase in taxes. I believe that the tax base for the State of North Carolina will support

any projected demands without the necessity for new taxes." "Usually someone comes up with the question of how do I feel about the responsibility of appointing committees for the State Senate. I tell them that I would be in the best position possible to make committee assignments, because I will not have made a single commitment prior to my election. Many of the members of the Senate will be new, as many incumbents are not running. I shall make the appointments on a basis of finding the best person for each assignment."

Except for two appearances each in Charlotte and Greensboro, Mrs. Harper's campaign thus far has been centered chiefly in eastern North Carolina with full days spent in Smithfield, Wilson, Kinston, and Fuquay and meetings in Chapel Hill, Durham, and Raleigh. This week, she will be in Raleigh, Montgomery County, and Chapel Hill.

ASCS

When Duplin County farmers signed up to participate in the 1968 Feed Grain and Cotton Programs they were advised that diverted acreage should have an adequate cover crop. A natural cover will be sufficient but these farmers are encouraged to plant a conservation crop on this acreage.

We believe that under good farm management, farm operators will want to plant a cover crop on diverted acreage. We suggest cowpeas, hairy indigo, or velvetbeans. The recommended seeding rates is 1/2 bu. of cowpeas; 8 lbs. of hairy indigo, and 1 bushel of velvetbeans.

ACP assistance is available for sharing the expense of seeding these crops at the rate of \$2.00 per acre.

Applications for federal cost-share assistance should be made at the ASCS county office NOW. Control weeds can build up your soil!

REPORTING PLANTED WHEAT ACRE AGE

Double postcards will be mailed to all wheat farmers in the county who have not participated in the 1968 Wheat Diversion Program today.

It is very important that these cards are filled out, signed by the farm operator, and returned to the county office. It will take only a moment. All we need to know is the number of acres of wheat planted in 1968 for harvest as grain. Be sure this is taken care of because this might affect your wheat history for future allotments.

For farms participating in the 1968 Wheat Program, the farm operator must come to the county office and certify to wheat acreage to be harvested by May 31, 1968.
