Calypto. He also said that he is especially pleased to be back home and to have an opportunity to renew acquaintances of long standing and be able to make new contacts as he calls on the business firms of the area to discuss their needs for data processing service.

Mr. Pigford said the equipment being installed includes six IBM Key Punch Machines and six Mohawk Machines which are magnetic input machines to the computer. Mohawk Machines offer a superior service in that they are far advanced over the usual method used in feeding information to the computer. No other service bureaus south of Washington, D. C., are equipped with this new type input machines.

Management Data Processing Systems will be located in the American Legion Building in Calypso. It is currently being renovated under the supervision of a local committee composed of N. A. Sloan, Bill Keebaugh and Cecil Langley. Other community leaders assisting in locating this new service in Calypso include members of the Town Council and American Legion. Initial employment will consist of approximately 14 key punch operators and several salesmen. The training program will be coordinated with James Sprunt Institute. Mr. Dixon Hall, President of JSI, has offered to provide the services of that institution in any way that will be helpful in securing as well as training qualified personnel.

Customer services to be made available by Management Data Processing Systems will include every phase of bookkeeping, record processing, payrolls, business statements, sales analysis and various types of statistical reports. Mr. Pigford said that they have a unique service to offer which includes a system for small businesses that consists of an aged trial balance, transaction register and monthly statements with a cash payment application.

In further comment on the decision of his company to locate here, Mr. Pigford also stated that the reception and cooperation given by the townspeople of Calypso and the Duplin Development Commission was a major factor in the final decision in selecting Calypso.
