offers the counselor \$25 for each student the counselor can influence to take a \$1,611 "historical" tour this summer. The parents of these students later receive an offer to buy a special plaque (costing \$14) to commemorate the student's "award." Investigation reveals a similar plaque can be obtained from a retail jewelry store for around \$4. "Spring also seems to bring out an over abundance of dubious schools offering to prepare the high school graduate for a variety of highly-paid jobs," Dr. Carroll said. "If these self-styled 'schools' can secure a list of graduates, they resort to direct-by-mail advertising. There also are many advertisements of courses of instruction which, in reality, are nothing

more than a set of books of doubtful quality and value, he said.

Dr. Carroll has urged that parents, teachers, counselors, and school administrators be on the look-out for these and similar "gimmicks." Miss Kathryn Ray, director of pupil personnel services for the State Department of Public Instruction, points out that the "role of the school counselor is to protect the individuality of each pupil -- providing leadership in the development of a program of activities designed to assist each student to achieve to his full potential." "In no way does the effective counselor promote any group or organization or attempt to influence the pupil in making decisions," Miss Ray said. "The counselor is in a position to appraise requests for information about students and to protect students from receiving undue pressure and being victimized."
