Be Well Groomed When Looking For Job

RALEIGH--Now that school is almost over, many high school boys and girls will be looking for summer jobs in an office, a camp, a department store, a restaurant, or other places.

How that boy or girl looks during the interview--his personal appearance--will influence the prospective employer, reminds Mrs. Ruby Miller, extension clothing specialist, North Carolina State University.

If two applicants for a job had equal abilities and comparable training and experience, an employer would certainly choose the more attractive, better groomed person, she adds.

Good grooming includes the selection of becoming, appropriate clothing and accessories, good taste in the selection and use of cosmetics, as well as clean hands, manicured nails, shining hair and clean teeth.

"Not only does being well-groomed help to create a favorable impression on others," Mrs. Miller says, "but it contributes to the feeling of poise and self-assurance on the part of the person applying for the job."

Whether the job interview takes place on the school campus, in a local business office,

or out of town, every effort should be made to put the best foot forward.

Appropriate clothing should be an important consideration. The garment worn for the job interview should be relatively simple in style and design, but attractive and becoming to the

wearer, the specialist believes. It is by no means necessary to buy a complete new outfit for the occasion, Mrs. Miller stresses. To do so may result in an unwise expenditure of money if time is limited and the purchase is not carefully considered in relation to the present wardrobe.

Social Security

Clergymen who did not elect to have their income from the ministry covered by social security will now be covered unless they sign a statement that they cannot participate in the program by rea-

son of religious principle or conscience.

The Goldsboro Social Security Law becomes effective for taxable years ending after December 1967. Clergymen who elected coverage under the earlier law will not be affected by the new provisions, as they will continue to be covered. As under the old law, clergymen will continue to report their income from the ministry and make tax contributions as self-employed persons.

Clergymen who cannot participate by reason of religious principle or conscience will need to file an application for exemption with the Internal Revenue Service by April 15, 1970. For those entering the ministry in 1968 or later, the application for exemption will have to be filed by the due date of the income tax return for the second taxable year after the year in which they become clergymen.
