## Recent Bride Honored At Shower

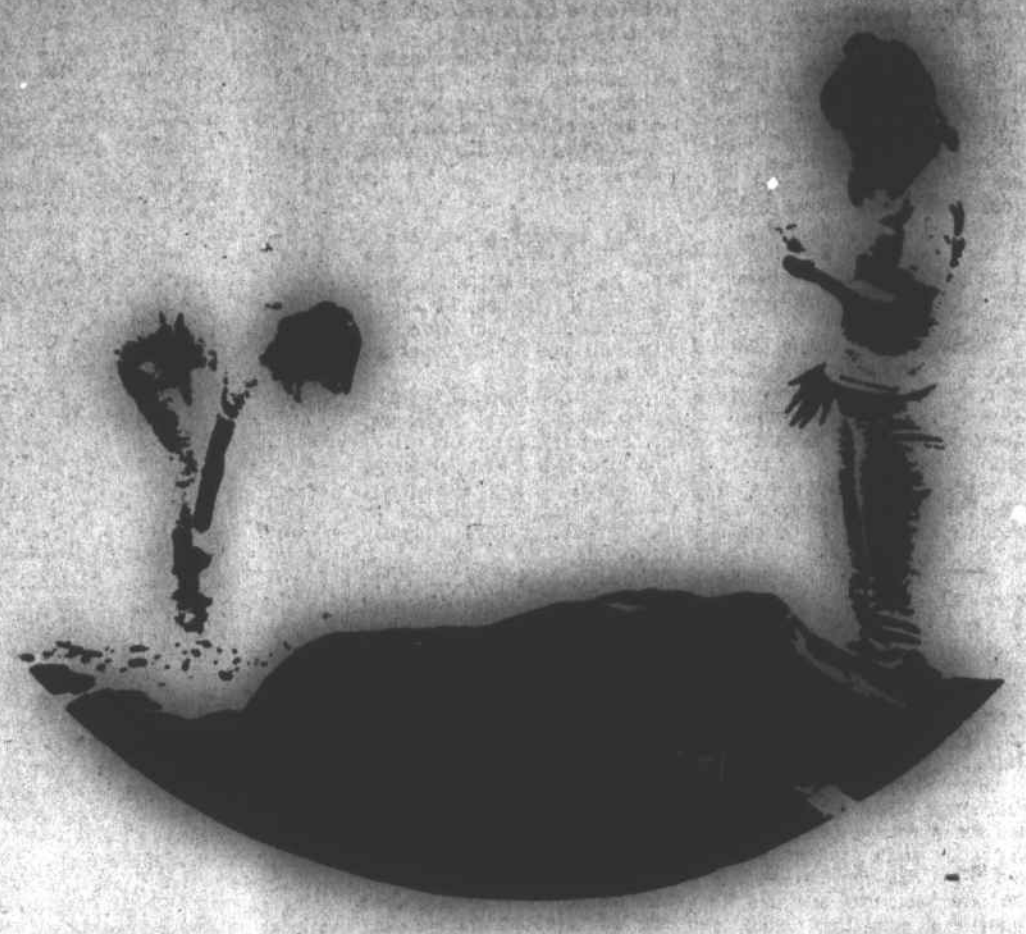
