The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, May 6.

The Duplin Airport Commission appeared before the Board and asked that an airport site be chosen in a central section of the county.

They further asked that the Board secure options on sufficient land needed to meet the requirements.

They also asked that the commissioners form an Airport Authority which was named as follows: 3 year terms; Francis Oakley, chairman, Kenansville; W. N. Rand, Wallace; W. L. Hennessee, Jr., Faison; Sam Godwin, Warsaw.

2 year terms: Fred Archer, Magnolia; N. R. Mattocks, Rose Hill; Harold Kornegay, Albertson; Alfred Wells, Teashey.

1 year term: Ralph Cottle, Pink Hill, Rt. 2; M. J. Lambert, Calypso; Raleigh Lanier, Beulaville; and the Chairman of the Wallace Airport Authority.

Rock, Arkansas, who is a member of the Presidents Committee on Mental Retardation. Her subject was the "Overview of Action Trends as seen by the Presidents Committee on Mental Retardation." She was introduced by the Honorable Ivan Allen, Mayor of Atlanta.

On Saturday "Religions Nurture and Mental Retardation" was studied. The speaker on this subject was Dr. Fred E. Henry, who serves as chairman of the National Association's committee on Religious Nurture. He is from Devon, Pa. Following Dr. Henry's address a panel discussion of the subject brought out the "Protestant Perspective," "the Catholic Perspective" and "the Jewish Perspective". The speakers on this panel were ministerial leaders of the three religions.

A talk on the "Religions Nurture of the families of the Retarded" was made by Rev. Milton P. Snyder, who is Senior Clinical Chaplain at Central State Hospital in Milledgeville, Ga.

At the luncheon which closed the conference, Mr. William Page, director of the 4th Region of the Department of

Health, Education and Welfare

spoke on "Development of Community Services."

Mrs. Vida Bryant of Charlotte, who is the Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Association for Retarded Children, was Staff Aide in the session of study for Recreation for the Retarded.

The findings from all discussions, all panels, all learned address, all workshops and studies point to the very necessary involvement of a wide community in the welfare of our children who cannot help themselves. We, in Duplin County, have seen the results of the efforts of a small county chapter. It has brought help to many who were considered hopeless not too long ago. Today we know, in Duplin County, that the retarded can be helped, and are being helped to the best of the ability of a small, inspired group of people who love and care for these children and what happens to them.

In our county a retarded child formerly was the CHILD NOBODY KNOWS. Now he goes to school, learning things that make him happier, more useful and far less helpless.

Today we know that the retarded CAN be helped--the retarded are being helped. The Association for Retarded Children is the voice that speaks for

children that cannot speak for themselves.

They cannot ask for special training and help they require, and they cannot campaign for needed facilities or legislation, therefore the National Association, made up of people like Duplin County folks who live all over the USA, tries to speak, and does speak, for them.

In our county, as in many others, we need more people to help to build a more comprehensive program.

What should an ideal comprehensive program include? There are 14 aids to such a program listed:

1. First on the list of needs in such a program would be Community Diagnostic--Treatment Clinics staffed with professional counselors, nurses, social workers, physicians and therapists. Since it is important to diagnose the child's condition accurately and to begin proper treatment as soon as possible, there should be enough clinics, adequately staffed to take care of all families that need help.
2. Home visit programs to help parents in the care and training of their retarded children at home.
3. Parent counseling to help families understand and accept mental retardation, and to foster happy and realistic relationships among the retarded individual, the family, the friends, and the community.
4. Day care services for

the severely and profoundly retarded, to provide some respite for mothers from the burdens of 24 hour care for the child and enable them to take care of the necessary duties for the rest of the family.

register their children for kindergarten at once. The allocation of teachers and the budget for the Kindergarten Program will be based on the pre-registration of kindergarten children and the average daily attendance for 1967-1968. Failure to register children might mean that they could not be accepted in the program when schools open. The Kindergarten Program is approved by the State Department of Public Instruction but funds to carry on the program come through the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The budget will be based on the needs of the children who have pre-registered.

The principals of each of the schools involved in the program have the necessary registration blanks. To enter kindergarten, a child must be five years old on or before October 16, 1968. A birth certificate should be presented at the time of registration. A record of immunization is also necessary.

Parents are warned that failure to register their child now could mean that there would be no place for him when school opens. Classes will be limited to approximately twenty-three children for a teacher and one aide.

Mrs. Sallie C. Ingram, Director of the ESEA Program for Duplin County, states that once the budget has been approved for a definite number of pupils that funds will not permit the addition of teachers and aides beyond a slight allowance for children who will move into the county from other areas.
