After dessert they went outside in the sunshine and had their picture made. Several were good likenesses but the above two were the best. In the first picture above we see, on the front row left to right Mrs. Cora Farrior, who has a son H. Ward Farrior still living in Rose Hill; Mrs. J. I. Cavanaugh, whom we all called "Aunt Quincey" whose daughter, Mrs. Lillian Alexander lives with her niece, Mrs. Marie Chestnut, and Mrs. Callie Henderson (Mrs. Willie Henderson). On the back row are Mrs. Cumie Fussell (Mrs. Jesse Fussell) who has two daughters, Mrs. L. A. Wilson and Miss Betty Fussell living in Rose Hill now, Mrs. Ida Teachey (Mrs. Coy Teachey) and Mrs. Ludie Alderman, whose son Carl Alderman and daughter, Mrs. Maybelle Alderman, live here.

In the second picture are, front row left to right Mrs. Callie Henderson (Mrs. Willie Henderson, Mrs. Cora Farrior, Mrs. Margaret Ann Cavanaugh, (Mrs. J. Q. Cavanaugh), Mrs. Ludie Alderman, and Miss Maudie Ezzelle.

Second row, left to right are Mrs. Cumie Fussell (Mrs. Jesse Fussell), Mrs. Mary Johnson (Mrs. Edgar Johnson) who still lives in her old home on Railroad Street, Mrs. Kia Teachey (Mrs. Coy Teachey) Mrs. Berta Cavanaugh (Mrs. John S. Cavanaugh) and Mrs. Cora Dixon (Mrs. William Dixon).

Some of these wonderful ladies have children and grandchildren scattered about the country as well as in Rose Hill. Mrs. Callie Henderson had a stepdaughter, Sallie Henderson, who lives in the western part of the state. Mrs. Callie was

Spec. Hargrove received the award for heroism involving aerial flight in action against enemy forces in Vietnam, Dec. 20, 1967.

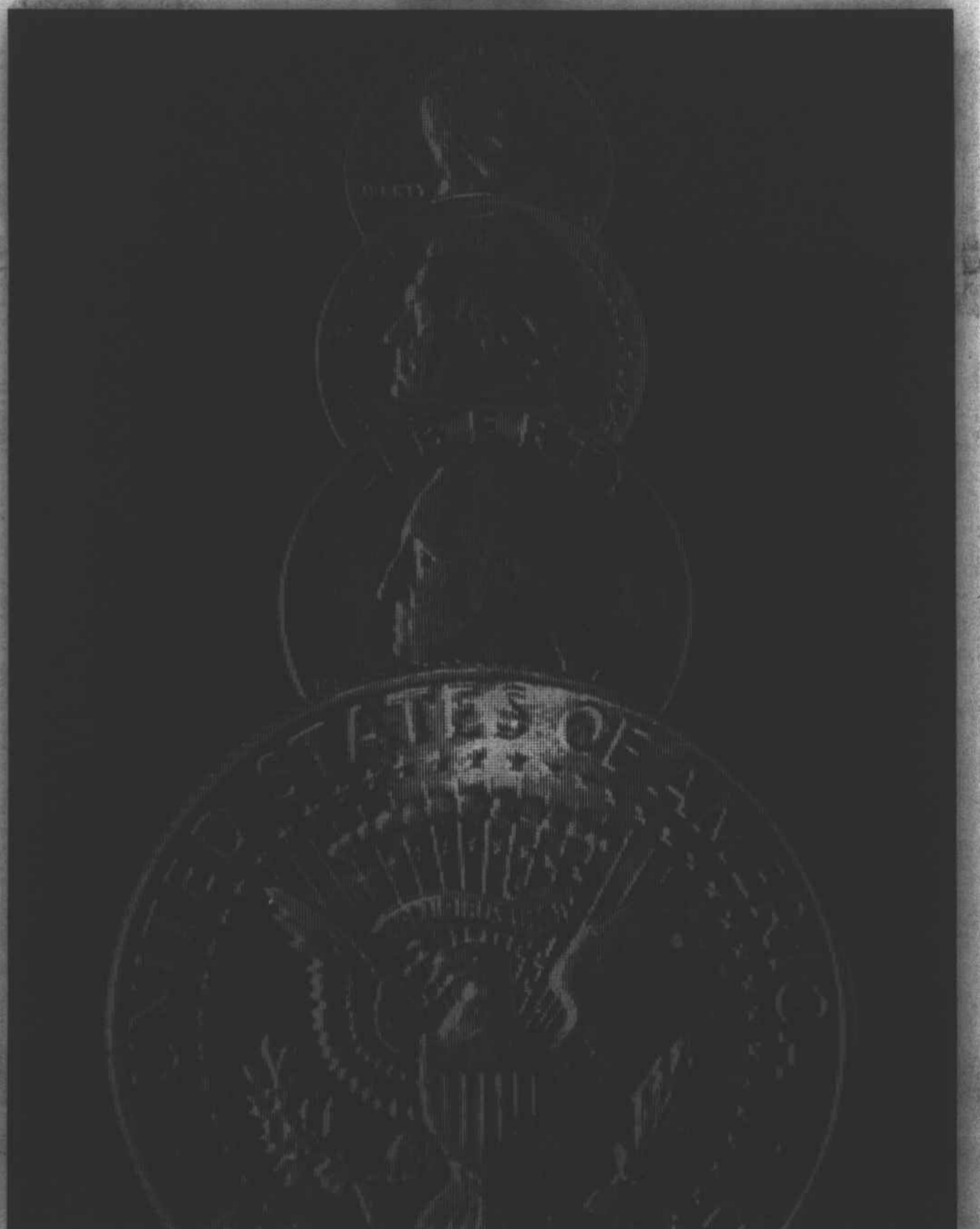
