This is the first grade children's picture of Rose Hill School in 1930-31 and they are a nice looking and neatly dressed group for the "most part".

On the first row, left to right are the following:

picture; Doris Evans, better known as "Buck" gets to Rose Hill often. She is Mrs. Geo. W. Brown of the Charity Community and only attended our school two years before she was transferred to another school; Dorothy Fussell is now Mrs. Odell Buchanan of Sanford; Grace Benton is now Mrs. Bob Collins of California; Alline Heath is Mrs. Lawing of Charlotte now; Rosa Lee Griffin is now Mrs. Hermon T. Smith of Fairfield; Fletcher Johnson lives at his old home place with his mother and brother Carson and they farm and grow turkeys; McDonald Rouse lives in Lawrens, S.C., and is married to Anna Holmes Lewis, who was one year later than he in school.
