

Q--I have just completed 4 years of active military service. Am I eligible for flight training? I have had no previous flight ti 'ning of aly

A--In order to quality for flight training, a veteran, re-gardless of how long he was in active military service, must have a private pilor's license or be eligible for one.

A--You certainly may be eligible. It is not necessary that you waive your military retirement pay to qualify for VA vocational rehabilitation. Check with your nearest VA office for information and assistance.
