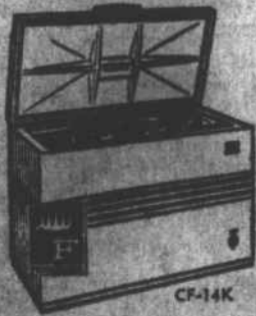

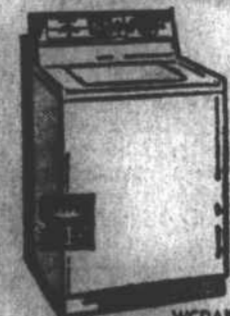

CORN \$1.25 BU. — CCC LOAN

Harvest time is here again and the price of corn has dropped down, down, down. The price of corn in this county range from \$1.00 to \$1.07 per bushel. If you cannot afford to sell your corn at this price, contact this office for information concerning the commodity loan program administered by this office.

If you have on-the-farm storage available and your corn is eligible for price support, which means you have participated at least the minimum in the 1968 Feed Grain Program, you can obtain a loan on 90 percent of your stored corn at a loan rate of \$1.25 per bushel. You can also store in an approved CCC Warehouse such as Southeastern Farmer's Grain Elevator, Warsaw, N.C. The loan rate on warehouse loans would be reduced by the storage charges.

The loan rate announced for soybeans in this county is \$2.50 per bushel. Any producer of soybeans can obtain this loan on his stored beans.

This loan program is very simple. The county office can disburse a commodity loan within 48 hours after you contact the county office. The interest rate on these loans is \$30 per month for each \$100 disbursed. The borrower can re-deem the loan at any time by repaying the loan plus interest. If the market price does not exceed the loan rate, the borrower can deliver his commodity to CCC upon maturity of the loan.

If you know some farmer who has obtained such a loan in the past, ask him about the loan program and the advantages of keeping your commodity off the market at harvest time. Also, your ASCS office will be glad to discuss the
