The East Duplin High Panthers shutout the once mighty Southern Wayne Vikings last Friday night in Beulaville, 7-0 in an early East Central 2-A clash. It was the first goose egg thrown at the defending co-

nference champs in over three years. It was the second straight win for Coach Dick Powers' Panthers and the second straight set back for Norman Clark's Vikings.

The Panthers and Vikings battled on even terms for third periods before the Panthers clawed their way to victory in the fourth stanza behind the standout performance of quarterback Mickey Quinn. Quinn passed 38 yards to Ivey Outlaw to the one yard to set up the TD. Quinn sneaked over to give the Panthers their first win ever over the Vikings.

Coach Dick Powers said, "It was a big win for us and a real team effort." "There is no need to say or name two or three boys that were outstanding, this was a one hundred per cent team victory," the likeable Panther skipper stated.

Chachi Thel Overman's Wallace-Rose Hill Bulldogs opened the season defeating the Yellow Jackets of Elizabethtown.

The Bulldogs sparkplug quarterback Jimmy Jerome had a hand in four of the five touchdowns. Jerome has been listed as one of the outstanding backs in the east. Jerome hit back Angus Phillips on a 40 yard tally and passed 12 yards to scabbard David Wells for another. He raced 20 yards for another score and ended the night going 8 for another. Jeff Carter plunged 16 for the fifth Bulldog TD. Lance Turner scored two pats.

Halfback Leslie Strayhorn figured in two Rocket touchdowns to lead Jones Central over Richlands, 33-12. Jones Central rolled to a 21-0 first half lead, with Strayhorn running two of the ED's and passing for the third. His runs were for one and 78 yards. He tossed a 26 yard TD to Jimmy Smith. Bill Hawkins ran 28 yards in the third for the first Wildcat score. Quarterback Ward Howard sneaked over from the two for Richlands other score.

Kirby Smith made good on two extra points to give Whiteville a 20-19 win over Burgaw in a non-conference game. Burgaw jumped off to a 13-6 first period lead after spotting Whiteville a 6-0 margin when

the Wolfpack's Greg Cameron returned the opening kickoff 85 yards. Burgaw got its third period touchdown on a two yard run by Fred Dees.

The James Kenan Tigers opened the 1968 football season last Friday at Tiger Field against strong Massey Hill but came up on the short end of the score, 19-6 in a non-conference game.

Massey Hill drove 71 yards in the opening period to take the lead, climaxed by 16 yard pass from quarterback Terry Luck to halfback Jimmy Baxley. Luck passed to Baxley for the pat.

In the second quarter tackle Duane Millard scooped up a blocked punt and raced 15 yards for James Kenan's lone touchdown. Back Steve Sutton's attempt was no good. The Pirates marched 40 yards for another second period score and a 13-6 lead.

With 23 seconds left in the first half Smitty Wits intercepted a JK pass and raced 44 yards for the Pirates third TD. Both teams battled to a 0-0 second half score.

New Head Football Coach Jim Turner said, "We blocked very well, especially in the second half but did not move the ball at all on offense." "It was

a real good showing for an inexperienced team". Turner declared, "Our defense was led by Larry Sanderson, Duane Millard, Pat Mathis, and Steve Sheffield; of course Sheffield did some good blocking on offense." Coach Turner was pleased with the offensive show of center Gerald Price as well as Sheffield.
