Nurses Learn About Poultry Lab

District #27 of the North Carolina State Nurses' Association met Tuesday Night, Oc-tobe r 1, 1968 in the Dining Room of Duplin General Hos pital. After a brief business session, led by president, Mrs. Mae Griffin, Mrs. Ruth Quinn, Chairman of the Office Nurse Section Program Committee, introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Hugh Powell, who is dir-ector of the Rose Hill Poultry Disease Diagnosis Lab, which opened in 1960.

This lab is one of eight in the state, working mainly with chickens and turkeys. The main purpose of the lab is diagnosis of poultry diseases and advise on how to treat, control and prevent diseases in poultry. They handle about 200 cases each month, each case aver-aging five birds, and serve an approximate 75 mile radius.
