With Our Boys

Perry E. Mobley
USS TURNER JOY at sea - Gunners Mate Second Class Perry E. Mobley, USN, 36, son of Mrs. Nancy A. Mobley of Chingapahn, N.C., and husband of Mrs. Beattie L. Mobley of Whittier, Calif., is serving aboard the destroyer USS Turner Joy off the coast of Vietnam. While operating in the Tonkin Gulf the Turner Joy demolished a substantial enemy resupply fleet 80 miles southeast of Vinh. Seven 100-foot barges were sunk and two damaged. Four 67-foot supply craft were destroyed and two damaged by the destroyer's guns.

During another mission the ship's guns triggered secondary explosions on five of nine enemy cargo barges hit. Later the same day, the Turner Joy destroyed one highway bridge and damaged another 45 miles southeast of Vinh.

A US Navy spotter aircraft described the shooting as the best he had seen in two Western Pacific deployments.

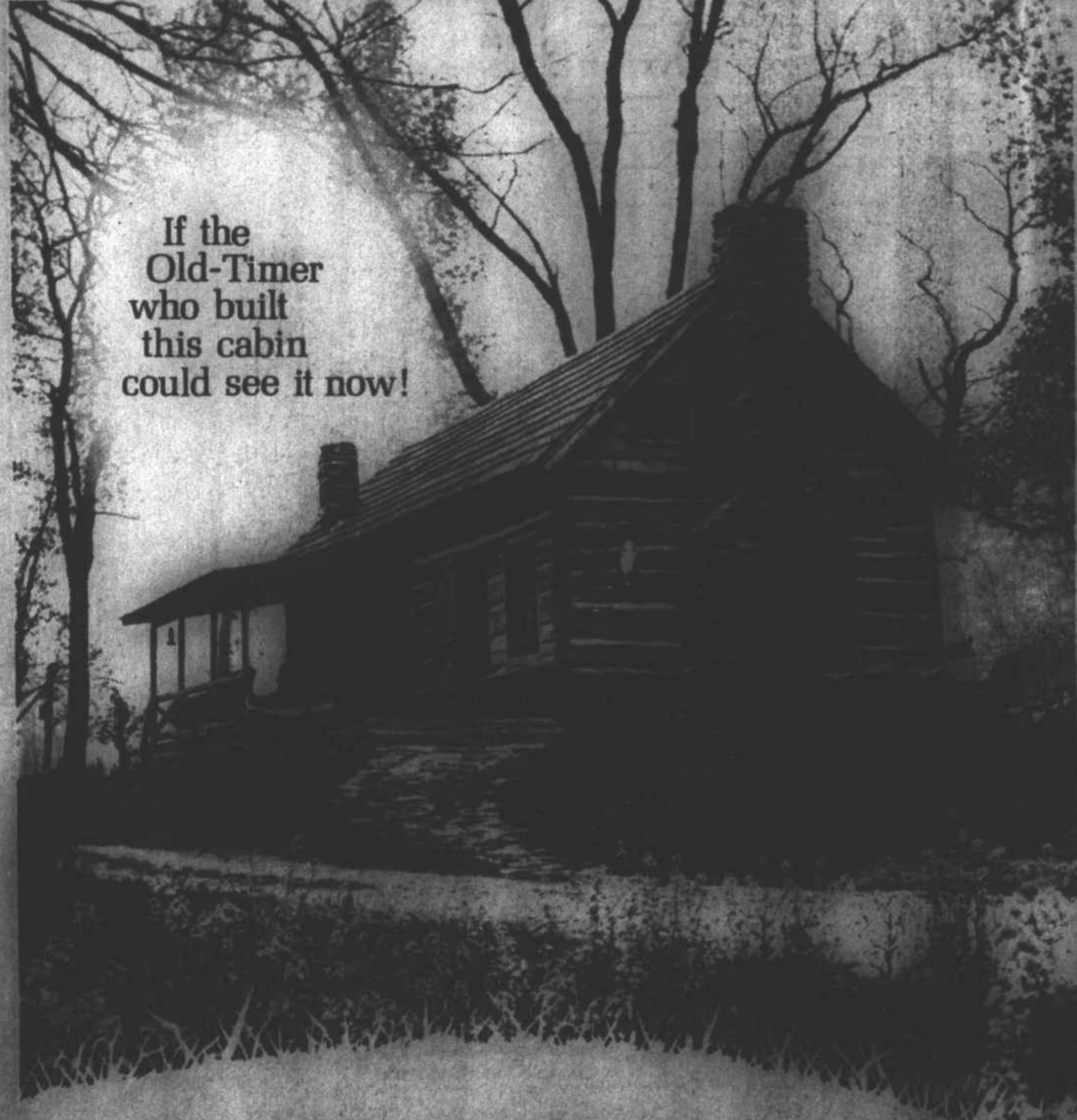
