A -- Since he is not a wartime veteran, he would not qualify for the \$250 burial allowance for a service-connected injury or was discharged for disabilities received in line of duty. However, if he served at least one enlistment and was honorably discharged during peacetime he is eligible for a burial flag to drape his casket.
