Stanley K. Marshburn

USS JOHN F. KENNEDY at sea (FHTNC) Oct. 31 -- Seaman Apprentice Stanley K. Marshburn, USN, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hardy P. Marshburn of Route 1, Chincapin, N.C., was one of 2,400 crewmen aboard USS John F. Kennedy when the Navy's newest attack aircraft carrier put to sea for the first time with an all-Navy crew.

Kennedy, commissioned at Newport News, Va., September 7, is engaged in independent exercises off the Virginia Capes. The ship will depart soon for formal training at the Fleet Training Center, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

While at sea aboard the Kennedy, he will take part in many phases of his ship's final trials. The cruise is designed to check out new equipment, train the flight deck crew and familiarize crewmen with the ship's characteristics. The first Navy jet take-offs and landings on Kennedy's 4.5-acre flight deck will be included in the tests.
