Audience Lauds Violinist, Harpsichordist

The audience at Kenansville Elementary School Auditorium last Tuesday November 26, 1960 evening heard a brilliant concert by Jerrie Lucktenberg, Violinist, and George Lucktenberg, Harpsichordist and Pianist.

Everything about the entertaining evening was right: superb instruments, the harpsichord especially built by Germany's leading builder, Kurt Sperrhake, and a 1718 Stradivarius; a devoted artist at the instrument who made the instrument a specialty; and a program devoted to pieces written especially for the instrument by its greatest masters.

Space does not permit a review of the entire program and certainly one could not attempt to classify anyone works as outstanding. The Sonata in G minor, violin and harpsichord (Geminiani); the Tambourin, La Livre, Les Cyclopes from "Pieces de Clavecin" by Jean-Philippe Rameau; the Sonata in C minor by William Babell; and the final selection Sonata No. 1 in G major for violin and piano by Johannes Brahms.

The only solo work that Dr. Lucktenberg did on the evening program was the performance of 3 Sonatas for Harpsichord in A major; "Grave", "Allegro", and "Presto" by Giuseppe Tartini.

Both performers were fine musicians, aided by excellent technical equipment, with a fine understanding of the style of their music. Their artistic integrity and oneness of idea and intent enabled them to provide an evening of listening pleasure. This performance was presented by the Tar Heel Fine Arts Society and James Sprunt Institute.

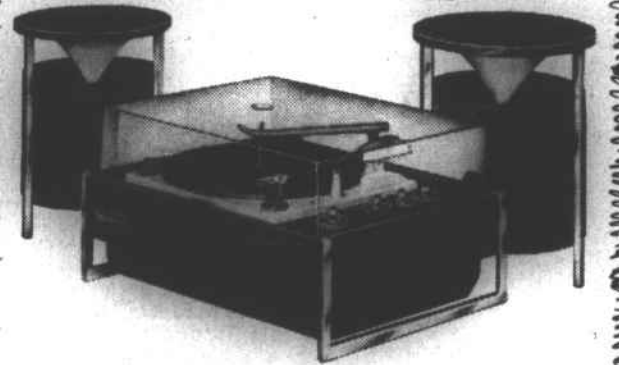

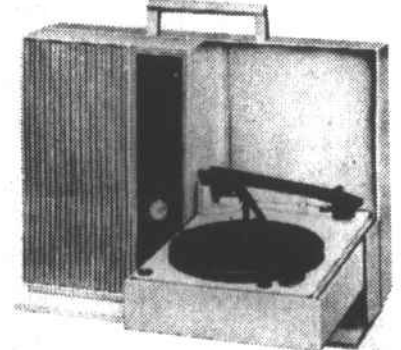
